


SPORT

Term 1 saw significant changes being made to the **Concerns** and **Complaints** section as well as the **Behaviour Management** section. **School Bus Transport** has also had an overhaul and we now have a new policy for **Dogs on School**

Dogs on School Grounds

Dogs are an important part of life for many Whenuapai School families, and are often included in activities such as walking children to and from school. The school appreciates this inclusion and values the place the dog has within a family. It also acknowledges that some people can find contact with dogs stressful, and even frightening.

Parents who bring dogs on to school grounds do so on the understanding that their dog has no issues around children, has never displayed any aggression towards children, and that the owner believes the dog is fully trustworthy in a school environment.

Owners bringing a dog or dogs on to the school grounds must follow the guidelines below.

Guidelines

- Adults need to be sensitive to the anxiety others may feel around their dog
- All dogs must be on a leash that keeps the dog reasonably close to the adult. The leash must be held by an adult.
- Dogs can be tied up for brief periods e.g. long enough to take a child to their class. The
 dog must be on a short leash and away from entry points so that people in the school
 grounds have a choice about whether they come into contact with the dog.
- If the dog is considered by the council or any other authority to be a breed that needs muzzling, the dog must be kept off school grounds.
- Dogs that have been approved to visit inside school buildings must be kept on a lead and remain supervised by the adult in charge of the dog.
- Dog owners should help educate children about how best to approach their dog.
- Dog owners should help educate children about now best to
 Dogs are not allowed to drink from school water fountains.
- Owners must remove any mess left by their dog, and provide water for the duration of an extended visit.

Whenuapai School is committed to teaching children appropriate behaviour when approaching dogs so that they have a positive experience interacting with the animal, and in order to reduce the risk of accident or injury.

Stray dogs

Any stray dog at school will be reported to dog control and taken away so there is no danger to our students.

HEALTH & WELLBEING

We would like to remind parents and caregivers about the spread of viruses in school. If your child is unwell please keep them home.

We have reported cases of nits and school sores in the school.

The Ministry of Health site has information on a number of conditions or illnesses that can be searched to help families understand what their child may have and what action should be taken. Please see a doctor if you are concerned.

HELPING YOUR CHILD STICK AT IT

Does your child sign up for activities - sports, dance, clubs, music lessons - and then quit when it gets too hard or they say they are sick of it? Because parents know how they had to persevere in life, they are naturally worried their child may become a quitter.

Don't think of your child's character as fixed. Most of our worries about our children are about the future. We see the 9-year-old who quits as the aimless 20-year-old. But who they are now is not who they will always be.

Explain the difference between "I don't want to" and "I don't feel like

it". Distinguishing long-term desires from immediate feelings will help children understand the difference between an immediate task and ultimate goal. This is a lesson that doesn't register right away, but it's worth planting the seed and emphasising over time.

Let them know you see the areas in which they do work hard or show motivation. Say "I know you're someone who can stick with things when they're important to you".

Get to the root of their concern. Why doesn't they want to go? Perhaps they feel they aren't as good as the others. What might make that better? Extra practice with your help? Help them see we often have to be not so good at things for a while as part of the process of getting good at something.

Children should have control over their own lives but that doesn't mean they can back out of a commitment, or waste the money parents have paid for lessons or



gear. If they are adamant, then expect them to write a letter to the coach or organiser explaining why they are quitting. This makes them take ownership of their decision. They cannot ask parents to phone and get them off the hook.

Keep exploring. It may take a while to find what really motivates and enthuses them. There's no rush!

We can't make them develop grit. We can expose them to things they may like, support them in sticking with things as they get harder and express confidence that they can handle the stress or the boredom.

The world is so complex that we have no idea where the things that will turn our kids on come from. If we encourage children to keep seeking what they love, and to work hard at it when they find it, that will help them grow into confident and self-directed young adults.
