I would like to start this week's newsletter with a couple of celebrations. Firstly, congratulations to our Year 7/8 boys football team for playing a great game last Friday against Waimauku Primary. The game was intense and could have gone either way - so it was fitting after everyone's efforts that the final result was a 5 all draw. An outstanding result and a great start to their AIMS Games campaign.

Secondly, congratulations to everyone - tamariki, whānau, kaiako and everyone else who has supported us over the last year. We are really proud of our student achievement results for the first half of 2023.

In the last newsletter I talked about changes in the education landscape. This week I would like to share information about Inclusive Education.

Inclusive Education - He wāhi mō te katoa - A place for all of us

Inclusive education is founded in the Education and Training Act 2020, which states: "people who have special education needs (whether because of disability or otherwise) have the same rights to enrol and receive education at state schools as people who do not".

Inclusive education means all ākonga (learners) are engaged and have the potential to succeed through being present, participating, learning and belonging. It is underpinned by the belief that our diversity is a strength, and every learner has the potential to make a valuable contribution to the wellbeing of their family, whānau, community and to Aotearoa New Zealand as a whole.

At Whenuapai School, we believe that all students have the right to learn in an environment where they feel accepted, supported, and safe and we embrace inclusivity as part of the 'Whenuapai Way of Being'. We are committed to ensuring the wellbeing of all our tamariki by creating a welcoming, caring, and supportive learning environment that treats everyone with respect and dignity 'Manaakitanga'. By promoting 'Whanaungatanga', (relationships) we continue to build positive, trusting, and collaborative relationships with our learners, their families and whānau, and the wider community.

We have worked hard to develop systems, processes, and practices that are responsive to diversity, needs and behaviours, identifying and removing barriers to learning and wellbeing, rather than expecting our learners to 'fit' within a rigid system of teaching and learning. We promote inclusive values and practices by working collaboratively with the Ministry of Education (MoE), Resource Teachers, the Kahui Ako, and across a variety of external agencies to access support services and resources.

Our aim is always to make a positive difference for all ākonga.

WHAT IS PEGL?

Positive Behaviour For Learning, also known as PB4L, is a whole school values programme focussed on building a culture where positive behaviour and learning is a way of life. PB4L is about teaching behaviour as we teach other subjects. It is based on an organisational systems approach to achieving academic and social success for all students. We teach the expected behaviour through the use of our school values and, when a student demonstrates an expected behaviour, this is acknowledged by explicit, positive feedback. By strengthening relationships and creating more positive home and school environments, we remove barriers to engagement and improve students' chances to achieve at school and beyond.

OUR LEARNER CAPABILITIES

Our Whenuapai School Learner Capabilities are:

- 'Mana' Respect for Selves
- 'Kotahitanga' Respect for Others
- 'AKo' Respect for Learning.
- 'KaitiaKitanga' Respect for Environment

Our learner capabilities relate directly with our PB4L Values. We believe that every student leaving Whenuapai School should possess these capabilities to support them to become successful teenagers and adults.

Our PB4L focus lessons work on a two week rotation and the desired, positive, behaviour is explicitly taught in every classroom. There is an allocated PB4L section built into each team assembly where our House Captains present lessons linked directly to the PB4L class focus. When a student demonstrates a focus behaviour, the teacher acknowledges this by giving explicit positive feedback linking the reward to the specific value. All certificates awarded at team assemblies also link directly to the focus PB4L value.

POYL VALUE FOCUS' OF THE FORTMONT

The PB4L focus being taught in classes during Week 7 and 8 will be 'Talking to each other Respectfully'. This demonstrates 'Kotahitanga' - Respect for Others. Kotahitanga is the concept of togetherness, and emphasises the benefits of working together to achieve a shared goal.

In the classroom this can look like:

- Collaboration and working together in a group.
- Sharing ideas and opinions.
- · Listening to one another respectfully.
- Affirming others recognising and acknowledging someone else's hard work.

In the playground this can look like:

- Sharing the equipment and taking turns.
- Respectful disagreement.
- Actively seeking support to resolve conflict.

At home this can look like:

- Giving and receiving compliments.
- When there are disagreements, calmly discussing the issue and reaching a compromise or resolution.
- Learning to apologise everyone makes mistakes


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
