Student Achievement Performance - Building on our earlier update on student achievement in 2023, we're excited to share a more detailed look at performance across the school and for targeted groups.

The following table compares student achievement in 2023 with 2022 for both 'All Learners' and 'Māori Learners' (rounded to the nearest whole number).

Every year, we establish clear learning targets to identify student groups with the greatest need for accelerated academic growth. These targets are directly informed by the prior year's achievement data for individual students and cohorts. Our ultimate goal is to empower all learners to reach their full potential.

Our 2023 Targets were:

Based on our recent analysis of student achievement data (2023), we've identified some areas where we can provide additional support to help all students reach their full potential. We're developing targeted interventions to address these areas, and your child's classroom teacher is happy to discuss them with you in more detail. Our 2024 Targets Areas are:

In Reading, the cohorts' percentage of tamariki achieving At or Above expectation will be:

- Year 3 = 85%
- Year 4 = 85%
- Year 6 = 85%

In Reading, the percentage of Māori Learners achieving At or Above expectation will be within 5% of the whole school achievement percentage.

In Writing, the cohorts' percentage of tamariki achieving At or Above expectation will be:

- Year 4 = 80%
- Year 6 = 80%
- Year 8 = 80%

In Mathematics, the cohorts' percentage of tamariki achieving At or Above expectation will be":

- Year 4 = 90%
- Year 8 = 85%

In Mathematics, the percentage of Māori Learners achieving At or Above expectation will be within 5% of the whole school achievement percentage.

While our achievement targets prioritize lifting cohort levels to match the school's overall performance, we also aim to elevate the academic achievement of the entire student population.

Fostering our School Values

In our last newsletter, we touched on the importance of fostering our school values and encouraging positive interactions among our tamariki. This week, we'd like to explore this topic a little further, this time focusing on an issue that has become increasingly relevant: the use of inappropriate language and the potential impact of online content on the language our tamariki use.

It's possible that some of the language we've been hearing from our tamariki could be influenced by what they come across on platforms like YouTube, TikTok, Instagram, and even some online games. We believe that the increased use of inappropriate language, is an important issue that we (school and home) can address together.

We'd therefore like to take this opportunity to remind you about Linewize - the tool we use to monitor and support students' online behaviour while they're at school.

Linewize is a FREE online safety tool available to all our families and here's how it can help you:

- See What Your Child Sees: Linewize allows you to see a filtered report of your child's browsing activity, including websites and search terms. This gives you a springboard for discussions about online content.
- **Spark Conversations:** Use Linewize reports to talk to your child about what they find interesting online. This is a great opportunity to teach critical thinking skills and discuss online dangers.
- Set Boundaries Together: Linewize allows you to set website filters and time limits for your child's internet use. Work with your child to create a safe and responsible online routine.

We will utilise our unique carbon footprint and data collected through the pilot to understand how our staff and students travel to and from school and to consider what transport options we want for the future of our community.

Along with our carbon footprint, the pilot programme will provide data tools to model potential changes, curriculum resources, and a Carbon Neutral School Lead. We will be having marKet day, where we will trade our creations! Over the next few weeKs, we will be creating our items to trade.


