Halloween Surprise




Last Thursday, students were in for a Halloween surprise!

PB4L CORNER

Last fortnight, our PB4L focus was on mana (respect for self), with a particular emphasis on integrity - doing the right thing even when nobody is watching and having the courage to stand up for what is right.

Showing integrity means making good choices and helping others to make good choices, too. Integrity has a flow-on effect. Seeing other people do the right thing acts as a reminder to check in with our own moral compass.

Here are some simple ways to discuss integrity at home:

 Talk about your own experiences of decisions you have made. Ask, "Did I make the right choice? What could I have done differently?" This will support your child to think about what makes a good choice.



- Ask, "What was a good choice you made today? What made that a good choice?" Speak openly about choices that did not have the best outcomes. Ask, "What could we have done differently? What have we learned for next time?" These questions will support your child to reflect on their actions.
- When reading stories, ask questions like, "Do you think [character] made the right choice? What could [character] have done differently?" This will support your child to reflect on the actions of others.
- Model good choices by thinking aloud. This will support your child to understand what makes a good choice.
- Praise your child for making good choices. This will teach your child the importance of showing integrity.




Waste Free Lunchboxes




Whenuapai School is an EnviroSchool and we ask that students come to school with waste free lunches (**Nood Food**) to show Kaitiakitanga/Respect to our school environment.



A waste free lunch means only packing items that can be composted or recycled. That means, no plastic wrap, no foil, no zip lock bags and no packaged foods. We have compost bins for food scraps which we feed to our worm farm which then fertilises our vegetable māra/gardens and fruit trees. Through this process we are teaching the students to be responsible for the waste they create and how they can make a difference to our planet. If students bring waste to school, we ask them to please take this home. Thank you for supporting our school value of Kaitiakitanga/Respect for the Environment.




